All the Details Included

This Timberdoodle curriculum kit is available in three different standard levels. The Infant Kit features items most utilized by ages 0–12 months. The Toddler Kit includes the items most used for 12– through 24-month-olds. The Tiny Tots Elite Kit (AKA the Birth to Two Kit) includes all the components for 0-24 months. In this guide, you'll find an overview and any tips for each of the items included in the Tiny Tots Elite Curriculum Kit. If you purchased an Infant or Toddler Kit, or if you customized your kit, you chose not to receive every item, so you'll only need to familiarize yourself with the products which were included in your kit.

We'll go in-depth on schedules momentarily, but for now, know that the items in your kit feature short lessons, not all of them should be done every day, and your checklist is going to make this incredibly manageable. Really!

Use the Customizer

On the next pages you'll find sample weekly checklists for your kits. Before you photocopy 36 of them, though, take a moment to check out the custom online schedule builder that came free with your kit. You can not only easily adjust the weeks, but you can also tweak the checklist to include exactly what you want listed. Plus, you'll be able to print your weekly checklists directly from the schedule builder, so you don't have to do that by photocopying! www.TimberdoodleSchedules.com

Activate Your Account

Before you can get started, you'll need to activate your account for the online schedule builder. If you didn't get an

activation email (perhaps you ordered through a charter school so we don't have your email address), shoot us a quick email at schedules@Timberdoodle.com, and we'll get that straightened out ASAP. Including your order number really speeds up that process, but our team is skilled at finding your activation info with whatever order data you have.

What's Your Dream Schedule?

Now that you're ready, you'll want to know two things:

1. How Many Weeks Do You Want to Teach?

At this age you are most likely to prefer a year-round schedule that helps you stay engaged with your little one every single day. However, if you are a family that is on the go

all summer and you're only looking for structure when the other kids are in school, a standard 36-week school year may be a better fit.

2. What Breaks Do You Want?

Thanksgiving, Christmas, winter break, spring break...you could also add weeks off that you're traveling, have guests, or...

Typically you'll be adding full-week breaks only, so unless you're




traveling to Disneyland® for little Johnny's birthday, you don't need to add his birthday to the calendar. For single-day breaks you'll likely prefer to just shuffle the work to earlier/later in the same week and keep on task otherwise. If you're using a daily schedule (next page), though, you may find it worth your time to enter days off as well.

Choose Your Items

Now just pop that data into the online schedule and scroll down to see the items you might have in your kit. Unchecking the boxes for any items you don't have removes them from your list. You'll also see "Alternative Items" listed under each subject. This usually includes all of our most popular customizations for this grade so that you can simply check a box and switch in the scheduler to preschool math for your advanced toddler, for instance.



Your course list is limited only by your imagination. Perhaps your babies always do water-safety classes, your little one has daily occupational therapy exercises, or you want to put your library's playgroup officially on the list. At the very bottom of the page, you'll find a place to add as many courses



as you'd like. Just walk through the on-screen prompts to get it all set up.

If You Used Every Tool This Week

If you took every tool out of your kit and put it to use each week, this is what your weekly checklist could look like.

Now, most tiny ones develop in such a way that they outgrow some tools before growing into others. For instance, the Junior Rainbow Pebbles kit isn't likely to be used at the same time that you're working on your newborn's tummy time!

So go ahead and finish reading the pages for your child's developmental age before you work out your own schedule.

We've also consolidated the emotional intelligence and math books under your daily reading category because that is what would make the most sense in our family schedule. If that's not ideal for you, by all means change that!

You'll find two other areas where we've combined tools on your list: sensory play and ball play. Again, if this approach works as well for your family as it does for ours—yay! If not, customize your own schedule online.



The Reading Challenge for Kids will get you and your tiny one reading a broader variety of books this year and perhaps discovering new favorites. This reading challenge is heavily adapted and used with permission from the fine folks at RedeemedReader.com.

Reading to Prereaders

Most of us probably have a deep sense that reading to kids, even the ones who can't talk yet, is a good choice. But do you know why?

There are dozens of appealing reasons, but let me just remind you of the three highlighted by the American Academy of Pediatrics:

- Strengthen language skills
- Build literacy development/interest in reading
- Create nurturing parent-child relationships "important for a child's cognitive, language and social-emotional development"



HANDS-ON MATH

You'll naturally count things with your toddler, from the number of times he can catch his ball to the number of blue rings in his Palette of Pegs. Try making it a point to count something together every day, and your tiny tot will stay curious about numbers and eager to learn more!

Scheduling 12 months+

Work these into daily reading time and encourage your child to find the matches, even though it's a concept he may not fully grasp yet. Making silly noises and asking things like, "Here's a fish. Can you find the matching fish? Where's the fish?" will have him grasping it in no time.

Scheduling

This is a tool you likely won't use as designed much before baby is 18 months old. When he's ready, add to your schedule about twice a week.

That said, if you have a younger toddler who is interested, you could start by just letting him manipulate the pieces. Do you have an empty tissue box that he could plop them into?

Next he can sort by color, and eventually shape. To make sorting easier, either limit the pieces you give him or begin by having him hand you pieces to sort until you're down to the last one or two. As his skills increase, he can do more and more.

Then, show him how to stack the Rainbow Pebbles. Because they are uneven, building will be a challenge, but the grippy surfaces will help him as he works to develop his fine motor skills.

Finally, introduce him to the activity cards that will offer him opportunities to match colors and shapes and even present a building challenge or two. Such fun! Again, simplify initially

by only giving him the pieces he needs and gradually scale up until he can find them himself.

PIXEL BABY

According to developmental experts, manual dexterity is directly tied to cognitive development. That's why it's essential to be proactive in encouraging your baby's and toddler's fine motor skills. Pixel Baby makes it fun and easy.

Using Pixel Baby's very large buttons and the transparent board with holes, your child will place the buttons in the correct holes. The buttons slide in easily and reinforce your child's ability to release an object voluntarily. The pieces come in three colors and shapes.

When the colorful side of a card is facing up, specific locations are shown for the various colors and shapes to be placed. On the reverse side of each card is a gray and white image that allows more freestyle play. Convergent and divergent play for babies!

Made in Italy, the Pixel Baby case has a built-in handle, making it easy to carry around. It contains eight toddler-friendly, double-sided pattern cards and 30 extra-large buttons, all packaged into a lovely carrying case. Pixel Baby stimulates creativity, visual perception, matching, fine motor skills, and cognitive growth.


Scheduling

Some toddlers will be more excited about finishing (or "fixing") a picture than about inserting random pegs into holes. If your child is intrigued by the concept, allow him to place pegs anywhere on the blank board and admire his art. If fixing a puzzle is more his style, put a card in and model

adding pieces, letting him add the last two or so as you hand them to him. Cheer him on and increase the difficulty slowly until he can finish a whole picture himself and even find his own pieces!

Keep in mind that the time it takes to insert so many buttons is a long time for a toddler's attention span. It would be appropriate to have him put in a few buttons, then call it done for now and move to something else. Circle back to Pixel Baby again and again until he's completed the entire thing. This keeps the work fun and also teaches beginning persistence and how to finish well even when it is a challenge.
